The Point

Once the "Great Camp" home of William Avery Rockefeller II, [The Point](#) has since been reimaged as an intimate 11-room luxury resort, nestled deep in the heart of the Adirondacks on Saranac Lake. This is where you go to truly disconnect—there is very limited WiFi and no TVs—and enjoy the outdoors by kayaking, waterskiing, and boating. The attentive staff can also arrange lakeside picnics or rock climbing in the High Peaks, all at no additional cost. Plus, unlike other all-inclusives, the rate here includes 24-hour access to premium wines and liquor courtesy of the many bars scattered across the property. Try to book your stay around one of the black-tie dinners—it's akin to taking a time machine to the 1920s.
